Trip Breakdown

Day 1: Monday 1st November 2010 ~ Dullstroom.

Route: Johannesburg to Dullstroom with various roadside birding stops.

Weather: Partly cloudy and mild.

Key birds seen: Blue Crane, Cape Longclaw, Buff-streaked Chat.

Day 2: Tuesday 2nd November 2010 ~ Dullstroom

Route: District roads in the region.

Weather: Partly cloudy and mild with afternoon showers.

Key birds seen: Yellow-breasted Pipit, Southern Bald Ibis, Jackal Buzzard, Bokmakierie.

Day 3: Wednesday 3rd November 2010 ~ Blyde River Canyon.

Route: Dullstroom to Blyde Canyon via Mount Sheba.

Weather: Clear and hot.

Key birds seen: Narina Trogon, Knysna Turaco, Mountain Wagtail.

Day 4: Thursday 4th November 2010 ~ Satara Rest Camp, KNP.

Route: Blyde Canyon to Kruger National Park via Abel Erasmus Pass.

Weather: Hot with overnight rain.

Key birds seen: Verreaux's Eagle, Taita Falcon, White-throated Robin-Chat.

Day 5: Friday 5th November 2010 ~ Satara Rest Camp, KNP.

Route: Various drives in the Satara region.

Weather: Hot with overnight rain.

Key birds seen: Common Ostrich, African Scops Owl, Lappet-faced Vulture.

Day 6: Saturday 6th November 2010 ~ Skukuza Rest Camp, KNP.

Route: Satara to Skukuza Rest Camp.

Weather: Hot with overnight rain.

Key birds seen: Saddle-billed Stork, White-crowned Lapwing, Southern Ground Hornbill.

Day 7: Sunday 7th November 2010 ~ Skukuza Rest Camp, KNP.

Route: Various drives in the Skukuza Rest Camp.

Weather: Cloudy and cool.

Key birds seen: Goliath Heron, Gorgeous Bush-Shrike, African Jacana.

Day 8: Monday 8th November 2010 ~ Pretoriuskop Rest Camp, KNP.

Route: Skukuza to Pretoriuskop Rest Camp.

Weather: Cloudy and cool, clearing in the afternoon.

Key birds seen: Striped Kingfisher, Lizard Buzzard, Bearded Woodpecker.

Day 9: Tuesday 9th November 2010 ~ Departure.

Route: Pretoriuskop to Johannesburg via Nelspruit.

Weather: Clear and warm with afternoon rain.

Key Bird seen: Dark Chanting Goshawk, Black-bellied Bustard, Purple-crested Turaco.

Daily Report

Day 1: Monday 1st November 2010 ~ Dullstroom.

The tour began at The Cottages, a historic lodge in the old heart of Johannesburg, where I picked up Alan and Cheryl Able at 09h00. They had arrived the morning before and already had some common Johannesburg garden birds on their list, such as **Southern Boubou, Cape Robin-Chat, Cape White-eye** and **Karoo Thrush**. We set off at a leisurely pace, heading eastwards out of the city and into the flat agricultural regions of western Mpumalanga. Our first stop was at a large shallow pan just off the highway, where we recorded **Greater Flamingo, White-breasted Cormorant, African Sacred Ibis, Egyptian Goose, Cape Teal, Common Moorhen, Red-knobbed Coot, Blacksmith Lapwing, Black-winged Stilt** and other water-associated species. Moving on, we visited another shallow pan where we added to the list **Black-necked Grebe, Yellow-billed Egret, Squacco Heron, African Spoonbill, Red-billed Teal, Cape Shoveler, Southern Pochard, Maccoa Duck, Wood and Marsh Sandpipers, Common Greenshank, Grey-headed Gull, South African Cliff Swallow, Capped Wheatear, African Pipit, Cape Sparrow, Red-headed Finch** and **Black-throated Canary**, among others. We then had an hour or so on the highway, with a stop at a large roadside service station complex where a 22° Halo had formed around the sun, catching the attention of all the restaurant and shop staff who were out in the parking lot peering upwards as we arrived. We had a final stop to try and find White-backed Duck, but without success, though

we did have good views of **Whiskered Tern** and also recorded **Ruff** as another wader for the list. We then pushed on to Dullstroom, one of South Africa's highest towns at around 6560 feet above sea-level. We checked into Cherry Grove, our wonderful accommodation for the first two nights of the tour, and then headed out on an afternoon excursion into the surrounding countryside along the Uitvlugt loop. As we turned off the main road we had a nice sighting of an Oribi (right), a small grassland antelope, close to the road, as well as views of **Banded Martins**. Other birds seen on



the loop included **Blue Crane, Black-shouldered Kite, Steppe Buzzard, Crowned Lapwing, Red-capped Lark, Buff-streaked and Ant-eating Chats, Cape Longclaw, Cape and Southern Masked Weavers** and **Long-tailed Widowbird** (the iconic bird of summer fluttering phantom-like in display over the grasslands). We headed back to town in the late afternoon and had some time to relax before a wonderful dinner at The Duck and Trout, one of the many pubs and restaurants in town.

Day 2: Tuesday 2nd November 2010 ~ Dullstroom

With an early morning departure we headed out of town and onto a dirt road that would take us up to the Veloren Valei (Lost Valley) Nature Reserve, a RAMSAR site high up in the Steenkampsberg Range. Turning off the main road we took our time, birding on the way up, though the mammals stole the day with a good sighting of a Caracal, spotted sitting under some trees by Cheryl, and after our coffee break a wonderful encounter with four small Black-backed Jackal pups playing in the morning sunshine outside their den. Bird sightings included **Red-winged Francolin, Yellow-billed Duck, Jackal Buzzard** (one of only a few endemic raptors), **African Wattled Lapwing, Eastern Long-billed Lark, Greater Striped Swallow, Sentinel**

Rock-Thrush, Mountain Wheatear, Wing-snapping and Levillant's Cisticolas, Yellow-breasted Pipit, Pied Starling, Malachite Sunbird, Yellow Bishop, Cape Canary and Golden-breasted Bunting. All in all it was a fantastic morning and with rumbling stomachs we headed back to town, where we had breakfast at Harry's Pancakes before going back to Cherry Grove for some time to freshen up before a walk about town. Our walk took us through a wetland area on the edge of town and then through town past the church square and up towards the municipal dams.



Birds seen included **Red-collared Widowbird, Drakensberg Prinia, Hamerkop, Cape Vulture** (flying overhead), **Olive Thrush** and others. Back in town we had time to get some lunch and relax a bit before heading off on a long afternoon loop via the small hamlet of Tonteldoos and back through the Veloren Valei Nature Reserve. Highlights for this route were splendid views of **European Bee-eaters, Giant Kingfisher, Southern Bald Ibis, Bokmakierie, Groundscraper Thrush, Village Weaver, Southern Red Bishop** and others. By the time we reached the Veloren Valei Reserve an afternoon thundershower had formed, meaning that the birding came to an end and we headed back to town, with a brief check of the Cape Eagle Owl stakeout which didn't produce any new birds. We then met up a bit later and drove down to Plat de Jour, where Chef Andy's porcini soup was a culinary highlight.

Day 3: Wednesday 3rd November 2010 ~ Blyde River Canyon.

Leaving Dullstroom very early, we made our way north eastwards through Lydenberg to Mount Sheba, and old hotel on the escarpment edge which provides some good forest birding. We arrived just after 07h00 and set off into the forest immediately, with a realistic target of 5 forest specials for the morning. Forest birding can be difficult at the best of times, and in these temperate forests the birds are not as plentiful as is more tropical forests, so keeping our expectations real was wise in order to avoid disappointment. But we certainly weren't disappointed with sightings of **White-starred Robin, Narina Trogon, Orange Ground-Thrush, Cape Batis, Yellow-throated Woodland Warbler, Knysna Turaco** and **Yellow-streaked Greenbul** as forest specials, and were well pleased with our results. We had breakfast at the hotel and did a bit more birding before heading on towards the Blyde River Canyon. We took a dirt road detour and stopped off at Whiskey Creek spring for a bit of a break, where we recorded **Cape Rock-Thrush, African Paradise Flycatcher, African Palm Swift** and **Red-chested Cuckoo** as new species. We also disturbed a troop of Chacma Baboons feeding along the creek, with loud barking calls of alarm ringing out as they fled to the cliffs above us. At the canyon we visited the Bourke's Luck Potholes, Lowveld View Site and Three Rondavels View Site before heading onto the resort (where we had a small flock of **Southern Bald Ibises** feeding on the lawn to greet us). We had time to relax for a while and then took a walk along the beautiful Kadisi Trail to see the remarkable Tufa waterfall, birding as we went. New birds seen included **African Harrier-Hawk, Lanner Falcon, Black-collared Barbet, Red-capped Robin-Chat, Green-backed Cameroptera, Mountain Wagtail, Greater Double-collared, Amethyst** and **White-bellied Sunbirds**, among others. We returned to the chalets in the late afternoon and then walked down to the restaurant for dinner and a drink.

Day 4: Thursday 4th November 2010 ~ Satara Rest Camp, KNP.

With another early start we had a wonderful walk in the resort grounds, this time trying the Leopard Trail but having to turn back when the path disappeared at a wide, braided section of Tufa on the stream and we were unable to find our way across. We returned via the Tufa waterfall route, and new birds recorded for the morning included **African Black Duck** (a brief view as it exploded off the stream right next to us), **Trumpeter Hornbill** (exciting as Cheryl's first hornbill species), **Olive Woodpecker**, **Lesser Striped Swallow**, **Kurrichane Thrush**, **White-throated Robin-Chat**, **Yellow-breasted Apalis**, **Striped Pipit**, **Black-backed Puffback**, **Collared Sunbird** and **Swee Waxbill**. All in all it was a fantastic walk and we ended up at the restaurant for breakfast and afterwards packed our things and headed on to the Abel Erasmus Pass, where we met up with Michael, the local site guide at the **Taita Falcon** nesting site. Unfortunately the falcons were not resting on the cliff face, with the adult pair probably out teaching the two fledged youngsters about the art of flying falcon style, so we had to wait around for a while until one of them eventually appeared. Unfortunately it didn't land and the in-flight views had to suffice, though the speed with which it flew was incredible to see and we were also rewarded with an unexpected sighting of a pair of awesome **Verreaux's Eagles** in flight over another ridge. We then headed on to the Kruger National Park, with a stop at the world's largest pot plant (a large baobab tree with a wall around the base that makes it look like a pot plant) and a stop at the bridge over the Blyde River, where we spotted a **Half-collared Kingfisher**. The next stop was at Orpen Gate, where we stocked up on snacks and drinks and then entered the Kruger National Park. With the day heating up considerably and bird and animal activity in a lull we pushed on to camp and then had time to rest before heading out on an afternoon drive. We drove southwards from camp to the Sweni waterhole, seeing a **Verreaux's Eagle-Owl** trying to get some rest



while being mobbed by a bunch of smaller birds which included **Maggie Shrikes** and **Grey Go-away Birds**. At the waterhole we found a pride of nine Lions resting in the shade, though their rest was rudely interrupted by the arrival of a large herd of thirsty Elephants coming down to drink. The Elephants chased the Lions off, and after watching them drink for a while we moved on to follow up on reports of a pack of Wild Dogs seen in the area. We came across a female Elephant with a very young, still unstable calf, and on return found a Wild Dog (above left) close to the Sweni waterhole, eventually getting great views as he moved out of the bush and onto the road right next to us. We left him looking a little lost (we were not sure if he was alone or if the rest of the pack were still resting down in the riverbed out of sight) and headed back to camp after an awesome afternoon of birding and game viewing in the Kruger.

Day 5: Friday 5th November 2010 ~ Satara Rest Camp, KNP.

With the sun rising very early at this time of year we left camp at 04h30 and headed northwards to the arid Mavumbye plains area, seeking birds such as Ostrich, Kori Bustard and Chestnut-backed Sparrowlark. Unfortunately we missed all three of these target birds for the morning, but did record many others, new records including **Green-backed Heron, Woolly-necked Stork** (left), **Black Crake, Red-crested Kohaan, Three-banded Plover, Sabota Lark, Red-breasted Swallow, Lesser Grey Shrike, Brown-crowned and Black-crowned Tchagras, Orange-breasted Bush-Shrike, Black Cuckoo-Shrike, Wattled Starling, Spectacled Weaver, White-winged Widowbird, Green-winged Pytilia, African and Red-billed Firefinches,**



Blue Waxbill, Long-tailed Paradise Wydah (not yet in full breeding plumage) and **Village Indigobird**. We also had two Lion sightings, the second comprising a pride resting in the grass near a zebra carcass, which they had killed during the night and which promised to deliver some good vulture sightings the next day. Back at camp we had breakfast and then took a walk around the camp, which produced a family of **Pearl-spotted Owlets, African Scops Owl, Marico Sunbird, African Mourning Dove, Crested Barbet, Southern Yellow-billed Hornbill, Red-billed Buffalo Weaver, Greater Blue-eared Starling, Southern Grey-headed Sparrow** and others. We then had time to relax in camp and get some lunch before a mid-afternoon drive via the Timbavati picnic site, which produced a pair of **Ostriches** with a clutch of chicks, returning to camp in time for Cheryl and Alan to join in on the sunset drive, which produced two very good Leopard sightings and a Lion sighting to round off a great day in the Kruger.

Day 6: Saturday 6th November 2010 ~ Skukuza Rest Camp, KNP.

For our morning we took the S100 along the Nwanetsi Creek and timed it just right in that we intercepted the pride of Lions with the zebra kill as they were leaving to go and drink water, with all of them walking right past us, giving excellent views. At the kill site we had good views of **African White-backed** and **Hooded Vultures** feeding on the remains. Moving on, we had a stop at the Nwanetsi Picnic Site, which produced **Black-crowned Night Heron, African Jacana** and **Greater Painted Snipe** at the rocky pool on the Nwanetsi, and other notable birds for the morning included **Yellow-billed Stork, Black-chested**



Snake-Eagle, Bateleur, African Fish Eagle, African Harrier-Hawk, Woodland Kingfisher, Purple Roller, Southern Ground Hornbill, Mosque Swallow (above), **Southern Black Tit, Chinspot Batis, Yellow-throated Longclaw** (strikingly similar to Meadow Lark of the US), **Brubru** and others. Back at camp we had breakfast and packed up and then got underway on the long journey south to Skukuza Rest Camp on the Sabie River. We arrived at Skukuza at 14h00 and

checked into our chalets and then had time during the heat of the day to relax before heading out on an afternoon saunter along the Sabie River. After the first bit of rain we'd had the termite alates had begun to emerge from their underground nests and the birds were making the most of the emergence, and at one spot we sat and watched a **Helmeted Guineafowl**, **Blue Waxbills**, **Yellow-fronted Canaries**, **Dark-capped Bulbuls**, **Village Weavers**, **Golden-breasted Butnings** and a **White-browed Scrub-Robin** feasting on the termites. At the high-water bridge over the Sabie River we saw a pair of **Saddle-billed Storks** and a **Giant Kingfisher**, while other birds included **White-crowned Lapwing**, **Little Egret**, **Wahlberg's Eagle**, **Pied Kingfisher**, **Wire-tailed Swallow**, **Tawny-flanked Prinia** and others, as well as two Lion sightings. With the sun setting we headed back to camp for dinner, which was supposed to be a barbeque, but with a big storm arriving as I was going to start the fire we went to the Selati restaurant instead, which is based in the old rail station, complete with original steam locomotive.

Day 7: Sunday 7th November 2010 ~ Skukuza Rest Camp, KNP.

With an overcast sky and somewhat cool weather we headed out of camp at 04h45 to drive along the Sand River and then back to camp via the Sabie River, with breakfast at the Skukuza Golf Club. Highlights of the morning's birding included a pair of **Gorgeous Bush-Shrikes**, only my second sighting of this elusive species in Kruger, with a male displaying to a female, and a pair of **Broad-billed Rollers** over the water in front of the golf club. We also had time in the Lake Panic Bird Hide, which produced great views of **Village** and **Lesser-masked Weavers**, **Goliath Heron**, **White-faced Duck**, **Black Crake**, **Green-backed Heron**, **Malachite Kingfisher** and others. We then headed back to camp where we had a birding walk (Black-collared Barbet below right) before having a bit of time to relax and get some lunch. In the afternoon we headed away from



the river for a big loop via the Nwaswitshaka Waterhole, though with the recent heavy rains these permanent waterholes were not as much of an attraction to animals as they had been a few days ago. Other new birds for the day included **Purple-crested Turaco**, **Jacobin Cuckoo** (including all-black form), **Diederick Cuckoo**, **White-fronted Bee-eater**, **Common Scimitarbill**, **Crowned Hornbill** (giving us a full house on the hornbill side), **Eurasian Golden Oriole**, **Grey Penduline Tit**, **Bearded Scrub-Robin**, **Red-faced Cisticola**, **Ashy**, **Southern Black** and **Grey-Tit Flycatchers**, **Scarlet-chested Sunbird** and **Bronze Mannikin**. In the evening, with the sky

clearing nicely, we had a steak and corn barbeque before doing our list and calling it a night.

Day 8: Monday 8th November 2010 ~ Pretoriuskop Rest Camp, KNP.

On our last morning at Skukuza we left camp at 04h45 and headed down the Sabie River on a slow birding drive, though the highlight came not long after leaving in the form of a female Leopard up in the branches of a large Leadwood tree along the southern bank of the river, right next to the

road. We had her all to ourselves as well, and after watching her for ten minutes or so she jumped down out of the tree and disappeared into the reeds of the river bed. New birds seen included **Dark-chanting Goshawk** (being mobbed by **White-crested Helmet-Shrikes**), **Grey-headed Bush-Shrike**, **Brown Snake-Eagle**, **African Goshawk** and **African Cuckoo**. Back at camp we had a birding walk, on which we had a good look at the colony of Peter's Epauletted Fruit Bats roosting under the thatch roofs of the cafeteria, and then had breakfast before departing for Pretoriuskop. The drive took us into ever greener country to the south-west of Skukuza, with the large granite domes dominating the grassy green landscape. New birds seen en-route included **Bearded Woodpecker**, **Levaillant's Cuckoo**, **Striped Kingfisher**, **Yellow-throated Petronia**, **Neddicky** and **Kurrichane Buttonquail** (a brief sighting as is the norm with this species). We arrived at camp and then had time for a short drive before checking in to our rooms at 14h00. After a rest and some lunch we headed out on an afternoon drive around Shabeni Outcrop and the Fayi Loop. Not far out of camp we spotted a male Lion lying not far off the road on another loop around a rock outcrop, but decided to carry on with the birding and return to see the Lion a bit later when the chances were better for a bit of activity on his part. We returned to view him a bit later and arrived as he began to stir, getting great views as he got up and walked right by us. Other birds for the day included **Black Heron**, **Lizard Buzzard**, **Black-bellied Bustard**, **White-throated Robin-Chat**, **White-browed Scrub-Robin**, **Croaking Cisticola**, **Violet-backed Starling**, **Scarlet-chested Sunbird** and many others, and a mammal highlight came in the form of a trio of spectacular Sable Antelope. We returned to camp at 18h30 and had a little time to get ready for our final dinner in the camp's restaurant.

Day 9: Tuesday 9th November 2010 ~ Departure.

For our last morning we left camp at 04h30 to get the most out of the day, taking some of the loops around the large rock outcrops near the camp. It was a nice, sunny morning and we managed to record a few new birds such as **Flappet Lark** (displaying high in the sky above us), **Pale Flycatcher** and **Lazy Cisticola** before heading back for a short walk around camp, on which we recorded **Bennett's Woodpecker**, **Black Cuckoo**, **Red-faced Mousebird** (poor views), **Red-headed Weaver** and **Yellow-fronted Tinkerbird** as new 'ticks'. We then had breakfast and soon thereafter left the Kruger, heading for the Lowveld National Botanical Gardens in Nelspruit. We had a couple of hours in the beautiful gardens, having a look at the cataracts on the Crocodile River in a spate of flood, and recording a last few new bird species such as **Eastern Olive Sunbird**, **Red-backed Mannikin**, **White-browed Robin-Chat** and **Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird** to push us over the 300 mark for the trip. We then had a wonderful lunch, during which the first of the afternoon's storms arrived, and then made our way back to Johannesburg through some heavy showers where the trip came to an end and Alan and Cheryl were left on their own for their self-drive trip to the KwaZulu-Natal Drakensberg.
